




They were tasked with writing a fact based story about the last 24 hours of Pompeii. They had to write their stories in a character of their choice from Pompeii itself.








### Our New Fitness Suite



The visit from Tim and Ali was very insightful about what they do and how they came to be, they told us about their life and how they came to discover their faith and how they supported people through the pandemic. I enjoyed the visit as it really opened my eyes to how the church can help people and how their beliefs developed.


production of 'Legally Blonde Jr.'



### Appeal for Hats and Scarves



he recently launched appeal for hats and scarves as part a campaign to create 'Warm Packs' for the area's most vulnerable people this winter is beginning to gain traction.

The initiative is a collaborative effort under Operation Cracker involving the Filey and Eastfield Neighbourhood Policing Team, Carers Plus Yorkshire, Eastfield Community Association and This is the Coast.

Feedback from This is the Coast has been phenomenal:

- The initial news article reached 3.9k people on Facebook and resulted in 143 clicks to the website.
- A separate post promoting the webpage itself has been seen by 3.3k people and generated 132 click throughs.
- 326 people have visited the webpage.
- This is the Coast is continuing to talk about the campaign on air, and will give it another online push in a couple of weeks.
- Donations have already begun to be delivered to both The Legacy Community Centre in Eastfield and to Carers Plus.

#### Commenting on the campaign Fiona Colling, from Carers Plus Yorkshire, said:

"We want to make sure that those who are most vulnerable have access to a Warm Pack. It is well documented that we lose a lot of our body temperature through our heads. We want to encourage people to layer up with hats and scarves.

So, something that we want people to do is make donations of hats and scarves that they have lying around at home, or hats and scarves that they would like to knit to donate to the campaign. Then what we can do is create a Warm Pack which will include a flask so that we can give that to people to make sure they have got some tools to keep them warm this winter, just to try to take those worries away at a time that is really difficult."
