Outstanding Work in Key Stage 3 English




The Y7 Creative Project is back and the competition is fierce! This time Y7 were tasked with creating a meaningful response to our non-fiction text The Boys in the Boat.

In 7EN1 our overall winner was Ellie C with Phoebe and Jayden in second place and George, Archie and Alivia in third.
















Art Excellence at Filey School

Sparx Science

In our last newsletter, I mentioned Sparx Science, our online homework platform. I'd like to give a special shout-out to the students in 7Sc2, who continue to lead by example with excellent engagement — well done!

However, it's important to note that 67% of students are not yet regularly completing their Sparx homework. We're aiming to significantly reduce this number, as Sparx plays a key role in reinforcing classwork and building long-term recall — both essential for student success in future exams and better outcomes post life at Filey School.

A reminder about Sparx:

- Homework is set every Wednesday at 9:00am
- It is due by 10:00pm the following Tuesday
- Tasks usually take 15–20 minutes to complete

Regular use of Sparx has been shown to support students' understanding and improve outcomes by the time they reach Year 11. Students who engage consistently tend to be more confident and better prepared in science.

How you can help:

Please encourage your child to complete their Sparx homework each week. If they experience any issues with access or find the work challenging, do get in touch with me directly, or encourage your child to speak to their Science teacher — we're always here to help.




Attendance Matters!




For safeguarding reasons, we operate a 48-hour visual policy during absences from Filey School when no contact has been made to the academy, by parents of guardians. Home visits may be conducted on day 3 of absence, if daily contact has been made to the academy. Home visits may be more frequent at the discretion of the Head of the School, Attendance team or safeguarding team. During home visits, a student must be visually seen by staff of Filey School. For safeguarding reasons, it may be necessary to request Police welfare home visits and / or social care support.

- Hair must be unobtrusively styled and in naturally-occurring tones.
- Nail varnish is not permitted in school.
- Any make up used must be discreet (looking entirely natural). Excessive make- up will have to be removed.
- No false eyelashes of any description are permitted.
- One pair of small ear studs may be worn in the lower lobe. No other items of jewellry are allowed (i.e. necklaces, rings, bracelets, nose studs/rings, tongue studs or eyebrow studs).

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

In today's digital world, it's increasingly common for children to form friendships with people they've never met in person. While online connections can offer children a sense of belonging, they also carry significant risks. Around 19% of children aged 10 to 15 in England and Wales have chatted online with someone they've never met face to face. This guide offers expert advice for parents and educators on helping children navigate online friendships safely



ONLINE GROOMING THREATS

Predators can use games, chat apps or social media platforms to build relationships with children and gain their trust. This may quickly develop into grooming or exploitation. Between April 2017 and March 2023, UK police recorded nearly 34,000 online grooming offences – an 82% increase in just five years.

EXPOSURE TO INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

Children may encounter distressing or explicit material while interacting with online contacts – especially via TikTok, Instagram or Snapchat. This is evidenced in a survey by the Children's Commissioner for England, which found that 45% of children aged 8 to 17 had seen content online that made them feel uncomfortable, worried or upset.

PRIVACY AND DATA RISKS

Children and young people often overshare personal details – such as where they live or go to school – without understanding the consequences. In fact, 4.4% of 10 to 15-year-olds in the UK have met up in real life with someone they'd only spoken to online.

COMPROMISED PERSONAL SAFETY

Meeting an online 'friend' in real life risks placing a child in serious danger. From abduction to coercion, the consequences can be devastating. Reports of children being harmed after such meetings are becoming increasingly common in the UK, highlighting the need for safeguarding intervention.

PSYCHOLOGICAL

Online harm - such as cyberbullying, grooming or exposure to disturbing content – can lead to long-term emotional issues, including anxiety, depression and PTSD. 'Sextortion' gangs, who threaten to release sexual information about a person unless they pay them money, have reportedly targeted children as young as 11,

LONG-TERM REPERCUSSIONS

Children exposed to harmful online relationships early on may develop unhealthy beliefs about relationships, consent, or self-worth. In a recent case, a 26-year-old posed as a girl on Snapchat to befriend children aged 10 to 16, manipulating them into sexual activity and causing profound emotional distress. One 12-year-old tragically died by suicide, highlighting the long-term psychological harm online friendships with strangers can cause.



Advice for Parents & Educators

TEACH SAFE ONLINE HABITS

Help children understand how to use privacy settings, protect their personal information, spot fake profiles, and report anything suspicious or concerning, like pressure tactics. Encourage them to think critically about what they share – and whom they're talking to.

KEEP CONVERSATIONS OPEN

Let children know they can talk to you about their online life. Avoid reacting with

ENCOURAGE REAL-WORLD CONNECTIONS

Support children in building friendships through school, clubs, hobbies and activities in the real world. Strong offline relationships help reduce children reliance on online platforms for social interaction, and can help them develop resilience and social confidence.

USE PARENTAL CONTROLS

Parental control settings on devices, games and apps can help manage screen time, filter out inappropriate content, and monitor activity. While no system is perfect, they provide a valuable layer of protection as children explore digital spaces.
